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# Corporate Social Responsibility and Sustainable Development: An Analytical Study of Public Sector Insurance Companies in India

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**Abstract--** Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) has emerged as a significant instrument for promoting sustainable and inclusive development in modern economies. In India, the introduction of mandatory CSR provisions under the Companies Act, 2013 has transformed the nature of corporate involvement in social and environmental development. Public sector insurance companies occupy a unique position in this framework due to their dual responsibility of financial service delivery and social welfare orientation. The present study examines the relationship between CSR initiatives and sustainable development in the context of public sector insurance companies in India. The paper analyses the role of CSR in promoting social sustainability, economic inclusion, environmental responsibility, and stakeholder welfare. The study adopts a qualitative research methodology based on secondary data collected from annual reports, CSR disclosures, sustainability reports, and policy documents of public sector insurance companies.

The findings reveal that public sector insurance companies are increasingly aligning CSR activities with broader developmental priorities such as education, healthcare, skill development, rural empowerment, and environmental sustainability. The analysis further indicates that CSR is gradually shifting from a compliance-based obligation to a strategic function contributing to long-term sustainability and institutional credibility. However, challenges relating to impact assessment, reporting quality, and integration with core business strategies continue to affect the effectiveness of CSR initiatives. The study concludes that CSR has considerable potential to act as a strategic driver of sustainable development provided organisations strengthen accountability, transparency, and outcome-based evaluation mechanisms.

## I. INTRODUCTION

The concept of sustainable development is becoming more and more significant in the present world economy due to the growing social inequity and environmental degradation, and the growing expectation of the society that business should make a constructive contribution to the society. Sustainable development is development that meets the requirements of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs".

Today companies are viewed as profit earning enterprises as well as institutions of social welfare, environmental protection and ethical governance.

Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) has become one of the primary pillars for firms to conduct development and welfare operations. CSR had largely been voluntary and altruistic. But the idea has developed over the years into a strategic business function related to sustainability, stakeholder involvement and corporate governance. India has also legally acknowledged CSR and is one of the only countries in the world to make mandatory CSR expenditure for corporations following the standards laid out under section 135 of the firms Act, 2013.

These institutions offer insurance services to many segments of society, providing financial security, maintaining economic stability and acting as a social safety mechanism. These are public corporations who have a broader appeal and are meant to partake actively in national development plans. Hence, the CSR operations of the banks have a pivotal role to play in promoting equitable growth and sustainable development.

The present study is an attempt to evaluate CSR as strategic contributor in sustainable development with special reference to Public Sector Insurance Company in India. The paper looks at the role of CSR initiatives of these organizations in helping towards social, economic and environmental sustainability.

Corporate social responsibility is the ethical responsibility of the corporation to contribute to economic success and to enhance the quality of life of the employees, the communities and society in general. The idea of CSR has evolved throughout time. CSR was then mainly related with charitable donations and philanthropy. But in the modern world of business, CSR is increasingly associated with sustainability, environmental responsibility, employee welfare, stakeholder involvement and ethical governance.

With the advent of the Companies Act, 2013, CSR in India has become more structured and regulated. Companies that meet certain financial conditions are required to spend a minimum of 2 percent of the average net earnings over the last three years on CSR activities. This has led to the institutionalisation of CSR and has prompted companies to embrace systematic developmental plans.

### III. 3. MEANING OF INSURANCE

Insurance is a financial service that enables a person or organization to shift risks and uncertainties to an insurance company for a fee called a premium. Insurance is a contract that offers protection from financial loss resulting from an unexpected occurrence such as an accident, natural disaster, disease or death. Insurance plays a significant role in economic stability by reducing financial uncertainty and increasing risk management.

Public sector insurance businesses due to their huge customer base, broad branch network and social responsibility mindset play a major role in Indian economy. The enterprises are not only providing insurance coverage but also act as a catalyst for financial inclusion and socio-economic development. Their operations are directly linked to public welfare and are thus significant stakeholders in sustainable development.

Besides their core economic functions, public sector insurance companies are engaged in CSR activities in the areas of education, health, environment, rural development and skill development for the welfare of society. Thus the insurance sector is an economically and socially important sector in the process of growth.

### IV. LITERATURE REVIEW

The relationship between CSR and sustainable development has a significant academic literature. CSR was described by Carroll (1991) in the four dimensional framework of economic, legal, ethical and charitable duties. The paper suggests that there is a need for companies to integrate social responsibility into their profit making for long term success.

From a stakeholder theory perspective, Freeman (1984) stated that corporations should be concerned with the interests of all stakeholders instead of only the shareholders. This post was interested in the role of CSR for corporate governance and sustainability.

Traditionally CSR methods in India have been philanthropy centered and have not had any strategic focus (Arora & Puranik, 2004). However, advances made later have rendered CSR a more controlled and more organised activity.

Jain and Winner (2016) researched CSR and sustainability reporting practices in India and concluded that enterprises are increasingly using the CSR disclosures for the purpose of corporate image and stakeholder confidence. But the study also found differences in quality of reporting, and absence of significant effect evaluation.

Rosati and Faria (2019) explored the relationship between sustainability reporting and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). They found that SDG-related behavior was more likely to be disclosed as a result of regulatory and institutional pressures rather than strategic integration.

Sharma and Tewari (2023) carried out a study of SDG reporting methods of Indian organizations and reported that social sustainability is considered more than environmental sustainability. The investigation highlighted a need for stronger environmental pledges and verified sustainability targets.

Singh and Misra (2024) researched the CSR integration of Indian public sector organizations and concluded that there is a high level of compliance but many companies choose a compliance-driven approach and do not integrate CSR in their core business plan.

The literature review demonstrates that CSR can contribute to sustainable development. But there are still certain gaps to be bridged in the integration of strategy, effect assessment and sector specific analysis, particularly for the public sector insurance market.

### V. RESEARCH GAP

The present literature on CSR and sustainable development in India has some limitations. Previous studies were mostly undertaken in manufacturing industries, private firms or multinational companies with very little attention being given to public sector insurance companies. Furthermore, the previous research mostly focus on the policies of CSR spending and transparency with minimal study on the broader purpose of CSR for sustainable development.

There is scanty study on amount of contribution of CSR operations of public sector insurance companies towards social sustainability, economic inclusiveness, environmental responsibility and welfare of stakeholders. In addition, combination of CSR with sustainable frameworks like ESG and SDGs is an unexplored topic in the insurance sector.

The appraisal of effect is really disparate. Until date the literature has been focused on CSR investment and activities and not on the evaluation of the development outcomes in the longer run. Hence, there is a need for an in-depth study for analyzing CSR as a strategic factor for sustainable growth in the case of public sector insurance businesses.



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#### VI. OBJECTIVES OF THE STUDY

Private insurance companies are not covered in the report.

The study employed a qualitative and descriptive research design. The secondary data are collected from annual reports, CSR reports, sustainability reports, official websites, government publications and research articles related to CSR and sustainable development.

But the data clearly shows that environmental CSR is neither more strategically integrated nor numerically successful. Most environmental activities are still more about awareness than impact. The CSR framework has a great potential to promote the goal of environmental sustainability.

One of the significant findings of the inquiry is the slow pace of change of CSR from compliance driven activity to strategic organisational role. In the early years, CSR in many public sector firms was largely expense driven and to meet statutory requirements.

#### *9.5 Challenges to the effectiveness of CSR*

The analysis reveals several constraints impacting the feasibility of CSR programs. But CSR is a good function in sustainable development.

A big issue is the absence of systematic instruments for impact assessment. "Most businesses are more interested in reporting on spend and activity rather than measuring long term developmental impacts." This makes it impossible to measure the genuine success of CSR activities.

Another challenge is the insufficient integration of CSR into the basic strategies of companies. CSR initiatives are often not connected to corporate planning and sustainability objectives. This makes CSR less strategically essential.

The quality of reporting and disclosure procedures varies, affecting transparency and comparability among firms. The lack of a reporting system makes it hard to assess the CSR performance and the sustainability consequences.

Also, initiatives on environmental sustainability are still at an initial phase. There is still a relatively modest emphasis on environmental issues comparing to social welfare operations.

Therefore it is necessary to enhance the effectiveness of CSR as a driver of sustainable development through impact evaluation, reporting standards and strategic integration .

## X. FINDINGS OF THE STUDY

1. CSR efforts of public sector insurance businesses are very important for the sustainable development .
2. CSR funding is mostly in the areas of education and health care.
3. CSR activities on skill development and livelihood generation are helping in economic inclusion and empowerment.
4. Programs for environmental sustainability are proliferating yet these programs are restricted in breadth and impact.

6. The absence of systematic instruments to assess impact limits the effectiveness and monitoring of CSR efforts.
7. Different reporting systems provide a lack of transparency and comparison between businesses.
8. CSR promotes stakeholders trust, institutional reputation and social welfare.

## XI. RECOMMENDATIONS

The study findings lead to the following recommendations:

1. Public sector insurance companies should enhance the system of impact assessment to analyze the long term sustainability repercussions.



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2. CSR programs should be in accordance with business objectives and sustainability principles.
3. Greater attention should be paid to environmental sustainability programmes and climate-related activities.
4. The companies are encouraged to report on CSR in a consistent and open manner.
5. Partnership with government agencies, NGOs and local communities should be strengthened to make CSR effective.
6. Support outcome-based evaluation and third party review to improve accountability and transparency.

## XII. CONCLUSION

Corporate Social Responsibility has gained importance as a strategy for sustainable development in India. The emphasis on social responsibility and the large exposure of public sector insurance enterprises have a crucial role to play in contributing to social, economic and environmental sustainability.
